Donated Microwaves Have Far-Reaching Impact

In our last newsletter, we mentioned how the owner of a redistribution company donated more than 30 refurbished microwaves that Caritas in turn, redistributed to five different clients we serve.

Our clients continued the redistribution process by giving them away to some of the individuals they serve. The recipients were thrilled and grateful to get them. One person mentioned that he had no working oven or hot plate in his home. The microwave allowed him to have his own, heated meal for the first time in many months. Just another reminder how some things that most of us take for granted, aren't always available to those we serve.

Donations down. Expenses up. What can you do to help?

Over the past year, Caritas has had to turn down four new clients due to a lack of funding—something we've never had to do before. But just like we managed to make it through the pandemic, we know we'll meet our current challenges and rise above to continue our mission of connecting those who have with those in need.

So, what can you do to help?

If everyone who reads this newsletter made a small donation to Caritas, that in itself might allow us to help those clients we had to turn down. But there are other ways that could serve as new sources of funding:

- 1. See if your place of work has a **matching corporate donation** program. Many businesses and corporations in the metro St. Louis area have that option essentially allowing your gift to be doubled. To see if your place of work has such a program, check your company website or ask someone in HR.
- 2. Many businesses also have **grant programs** and want to do their part

to help St. Louis become better as a community. We have been fortunate to receive grants from a few companies, but we know there are more who could help - and having a connection from someone within the organization is often the key to success. Check to see if your company offers grants and let us know.

- 3. Know any **grant writers**? We've been pursuing grants through a variety of sources but would love to have additional help.
- 4. Have a **fund-raising idea**? A dinner auction? Trivia night? Neighborhood car wash? We're open to any and all ideas and not just to raise money during the pandemic, there were a variety of fundraisers that featured area restaurants, neighborhood as well as school-related canned food drives all aimed at getting more of the items that our clients need.

A Special Salute to Sr. Carol Ann Callahan

As one of the founding members of the St. Augustine Wellston Center, Sister Carol Ann Callahan has always been passionate about serving the needs of others. Her commitment was evident on a daily basis. "She always had a smile on her face," said Janet Wittenauer who often made Caritas deliveries direct to Sister Carol.

About two years ago, Sister Carol stepped aside as director of the Center. But her impact on the community remains. She founded a Senior Support Group at the Wellston Center that is now run by Haley Calabro. And she was instrumental in getting the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to back down from their intent to demolish not only the Wellston Center, but also 200 public housing units in Wellston.

"Sister Carol spearheaded the effort to save all those units," said Haley. "Now they're completely redoing those units - and much of that is thanks to her efforts and dedication."

Sister Carol currently resides at Catherine's Residence within the Mercy Center. Haley mentioned at the close of her interview, "If I could thank her on behalf of the community, I most certainly would." So, on behalf of Haley, and everyone connected with the Wellston Center as well as those of us at Caritas, "Thank you, Sister Carol and job well done!"

Client Profile: St. Augustine Wellston Center

The St. Augustine Wellston Center was founded in 1993 by Sr. Mary Beckmann and Sr. Kathy Stark, Sisters of Notre Dame along with Sr. Carol Ann Callahan, Sister of Mercy. To this day, the mission remains the same: to support low-income people in the Wellston area by providing nutritious food, affordable staples, social service support and health needs in a supportive environment.

Even before Caritas was officially founded in 2002, Father Bryon was making regular food deliveries to the Center. Over the years, that connection has grown beyond food items to include personal care products, clothing, and a variety of other items.

Haley Calabro, Executive Director of the Wellston Center, is appreciative of all that Caritas does. "Caritas allows us to offer our clients consistency," said Haley. "Thanks to their regular weekly donations, we have the products our clients need that food stamps won't always buy."

Calabro, who's been at the Wellston Center since 2020, has seen firsthand the good that comes about through their connection to Caritas. "Just recently, Caritas provided us with 16 refurbished microwaves that we made available to some of our clients. They were truly overjoyed to receive what for them was a luxury to help elevate their cooking experience."

Beyond the weekly deliveries, Caritas also helps to support the Wellston Center's annual Christmas Club where customers can purchase brand new items at greatly reduced prices. "Caritas has brought us toys, small appliances and some clothing items that help to transform their space—and their holidays," said Haley.

"Every time I see that Caritas van roll into our lot on Tuesdays, I'm grateful for all that Caritas does—and know our clients are, too," said Haley.

"It gives the people who struggle a little self-respect, knowing they were able to purchase a brandnew item that can be given (or received) as a Christmas gift."

"Caritas does so much for so many," said Janet. And they're both amazed at how many different clients Caritas serves and what it takes to serve them all each and every week.

Bill picks up treats from Smallcakes on Mondays and Thursdays and often helps with deliveries. He has also served yearly on the Golf Tournament's Committee, being tasked with the purchase of the popular "gift" every year.

"I'm a very organized person," said Janet. "And Caritas is such a well-run organization - Bill and I are proud to be volunteers and contribute however we can.
